All About the SJ CRC

The Community Resource Centre (CRC) Network is comprised of over 100 rural, remote and regional CRC's. The CRC's are not-for-profit organisations that need to be profitable, are independently operated by paid staff for the benefit of their local communities.

CRC's provide access to government and community services and information, and undertake community, business and tourism and other social and economic development activities.

The network is supported by the Department of Regional Development via their Regional Capacity Division, with funding from the State Governments Royalties for Regions program.

The Serpentine Jarrahdale Community Resource Centre currently employs 2 full-time staff and 3 part-time staff, and is managed by a volunteer Management Board, all working tirelessly to ensure the CRC remains an integral service provider that continually meets the needs of the community. The centre has also, over its lifetime, successfully had 11 traineeships completed.

The Centre relies on grant funding, project partnerships and sponsorship to continue to make available the many community events and seminars, such as the SJ Community Fair, business networking and other assorted events throughout the year.



We value community input into the Centre and welcome any feedback, suggestions and potential partnerships with other community organisations and businesses.

RAIL HISTORY OF THE SERPENTINE JARRAHDALE AREA

The Serpentine Jarrahdale Library Friends Inc. is thrilled to be hosting this exciting talk by two knowledgeable and experienced historians. To be held in the SJ Community Resource Centre, Mundijong, it will be of interest to many people who value the significance of rail history in the district.

Charles De Bruin and his family live in Mundijong and Charles has worked as a locomotive driver for 42 years. He is a lifelong train enthusiast. Also a keen train photographer, Charles has an extensive photographic collection dating from the 1970s. A founder member of the Bennett Brook Railway in Whiteman Park, Charles held the positions of president and club magazine editor for several years.



Charles has a passionate interest in rail modeling and has crafted many models of the locomotives he operated as a young driver and will kindly display some of his models at the talk. Currently, Charles is writing a history of grain trains in WA.



David Whiteford has worked with the historical documents of Western Australia for over 40 years in both the J. S. Battye Library of West Australian History and the State Records Office of WA. During his working career he has curated most of the material types held

by these two agencies, specializing as Map Librarian responsible for Government plans as well as published maps, including WA Government railway plans.

His special interest is in the railway history of the State and he has had many articles published in national railway literature.

We invite anyone interested in our local rail history to join us at the Resource Centre on 23 July at 6pm for an interesting evening.

TRAINING TIPS FOR A HAPPY DOG

The best way to start training with your dog or puppy is to develop trust. Building a strong relationship is built on trust and confidence. If your dog feels confident and secure with your training guidance they are much more likely to respond.

Training Tips

- When interacting with your dog keep it positive! Encourage good behaviour with praise.
- Use reward based training. This means using rewards that your dog likes. Rewards can include verbal praise, pats, food, toys, play or 'life rewards' for example if your dog is walking nicely on the lead let them 'stop and smell the roses' (or whatever interesting smell they may be drawn to...)
- Set your dog up for success; put them in environments that help build their confidence and at the same time have some level of control (such as a long lead if needed) so they respond to you when its needed.
- Ignore unwanted behaviours (where possible). Sometimes dogs misbehave for attention. An example of this would be jumping up. If you ignore this behaviour it will tend to stop. Just keep in mind attention to the dog includes; eye contact, verbal corrections or pushing them away. When you start to ignore the behaviour it may get worse to start with (as the dog may try even harder to get your attention!) but it will reduce.
- Make sure all family members are consistent. If some family members encourage misbehaviour then it will make it much harder to manage & correct.
- Get the family involved. Family members should help in all areas of the dog's life; from walking and general care, feeding, play and training. This will ensure consistency with the family members & helps the dog bond with all family members.
- Teach the dog what it needs to know! It may seem obvious but sometimes people think dogs should just know what to do in situations: If we haven't taught them how we would like them to respond then it is not fair on the dog to correct behaviours when we have not taught them what is appropriate.
- Training & re-training can take time & patience, especially with an older dog. But if you manage situations so that an unwanted behaviour is not practiced then you will find it's easier and less stressful for all.
- If a dog is not responding well to training there may be a few reasons why
- Have you taught them the skills they need to know and practiced it in different environments with different levels of distractions? Dogs don't generalize training well so it is important to practice training in different environments & increase the level of distraction gradually if your dog is having trouble.
- They may be stressed. If they have an underlying behaviour problem this should be dealt with first. Stress will reduce learning ability.
- Avoid punishment. It can cause fear, anxiety or even aggression. It can also damage the bend you have with your wonderful companion.
- They may not understand what you are asking of them. Try a different approach to your training.

KNITTED ANZAC POPPIES

The Byford Progress Association has been involved in the community Anzac Day service that is held in a different town around the Shire of Serpentine Jarrahdale each year for the past 10 years. Early this year we decided to ask the Bendigo Bank if we provided poppies would they display them and some local historical photos for this special Anzac Centenary year.

What started as a Byford project, took on a life of its own and very soon we had women from all over the Shire and beyond knitting and crocheting poppies. Both the Shire Library in Mundijong and the Serpentine Jarrahdale Resource Centre held sessions for people to learn how to make the poppies and we were busy sending out patterns and wool.

It soon became obvious that we would have far too many poppies to be displayed in the bank and we began to provide them and historical photos to many venues throughout the Shire. There were Anzac poppy displays in Byford Post Office, Tavern, Country Club, Bendigo Bank, Medical Centre, Hall, Graceford, St Aidan's, the Recreation Centre, Mundijong Chemist, Library, Resource Centre and Shire Office, Jarrahdale Old Post Office and Serpentine Chemist.

The next logical step was to think about what would happen to the poppies after Anzac Day and the project was expanded again to provide baskets or boxes of poppies and money tins to all the venues for the sale of the poppies to raise money for returned service men and women.

The community response was amazing and a grand total of \$2,864 was raised and presented to the RSL.

Chris Mooney states that the evidence has been rolling in to support the research that has been done by the Centre for Research in Environmental Epidemiology in Barcelona. The Centre studied the brain development of children is several different countries and compared



them with the amount of trees and greenery that the children experienced on their way to school and at school. The conclusion is that green spaces are good for the brain development of children.

I encourage residents to become more active and phone, email, write or talk to our politicians and councillors and demand that it is essential that we all support the 202020 Vision. It is vital that we actually do something to preserve and improve on what we presently have here in beautiful Serpentine Jarrahdale.

MUNDIJONG HERITAGE COMMUNITY GARDEN

Located in the grounds of the Mundijong Heritage Uniting Church on the main street of Mundijong, the Community Garden has been operating since 2008. The Mundijong Heritage Community Garden is a not for profit community group run by dedicated local volunteers. We gather together to enjoy time in the garden and to build real community relationships, whilst making a difference to the local environment.

Starting from a patch of wild oats, the grounds have been transformed into an established working garden which is now producing lovely fresh vegetables, herbs and some fruit. Bore water is used in the garden to reduce the use of scheme water. Plans for the future include further development of the vegetable gardens. Recently the church building has had some major renovations including re-stumping of the floor. All work was undertaken by volunteers with funding being provided from various grants and fund raising endeavours by members.

From the ages 17-32 she worked as a busy Shearing Contractor, running over eight shearing teams and employing well over 80 hard-working employees a year while shearing millions of sheep all over the rurally remote South-East of Western Australia.

In between shearing she also found some spare time here and there to; work at the local Shire Council, cook and wash for many shearers, pull beers at her 'local', roustabout, write articles for the local paper, own and operate a rural School Bus Service, become an Accredited

Tennis Instructor, cook at the local roadhouse, coach Netball, work as a Medical Receptionist, study Theology parttime, volunteer in her community, work as a Special Needs Assistant with the Education Department, become a Care-

Aide with Silver Chain and work as an Auction Clerk; helping to count and auction hundreds of thousands of sheep at the Katanning Regional Saleyard each week. A hearty work ethic was instilled in her from a very early age by her parents and she continues laughing her way through a life of endless writing, working hard and being a good Mum.

It took 5 years of thinking about writing the book, 2 years to write and research the book , and 8 months of submissions to finally have it published. Megan first handwrote her memoirs feeling that physically writing reflected her love of words.



This rural story tells of the lived experience and the history and culture of the shearing trade. The memoirs give insight into the hard life in the shearing industry including the indigenous and Maori place on the shearing teams. 



DID YOU KNOW

The human head contains 22 bones, consisting the cranium and the facial bones. The cranium is formed by 8 bones: the frontal bone, two parietal bones, two temporal bones, the occipital bone in the back, the ethmoid bone behind the nose, and the sphenoid bone.

The cranium protects the brain, which, for an average adult male weighs about 1400 gram (49 oz). Einstein's brain weighed 1230 gram (43.39 ounces), meaning Einstein's brain was smaller than average. Female average brain mass is slightly less than that of males. The largest woman's brain was weighed at1742g (61 oz).

Human brain vs animal brain - An elephant's brain weighs 5000g (176oz or 11 lb), a whale's 10000g (352oz or 22lb). In proportion to the body, the whale has a much smaller brain than man. This seem to give man the edge, until it was discovered that the dwarf monkey has 1g of brain per 27g (0.95oz) of body, and the capuchin monkey has 1g of brain per 17,5g body, whereas man has 1 gram of brain to 44g of body.

Brain power - The human brains consists of more than 100 billion neurons (nerve cells) through which the brain's commands are sent in the form of electric pulses. These pulses travel at more than 400 km/h (250 mph), creating enough electricity to power a light bulb. The brain consumes more energy than any other organ, burning up a whopping 20% of the food we take in.

The left side of your brain controls the right side of your body and the right side of your brain controls the left side of your body.

The seeing brain - One-quarter of the brains in used to control the eye. We actually see with our brains, with the eyes basically being cameras.

You're born with 300 bones, but when you get to be an adult, you only have 206.

But consider this: for all the complexity of the brain, you still have only one thought at a time. Make it a positive thought.
